Business 1—Tuesday, April 5—4:00p.m. (Linda Clark recording)

History: Review of who we are and how we got here

Dorothy Naylor provided a brief history of diaconal ministry within the United Church of Canada: How we journeyed from deaconesses to commissioned ministers to diaconal ministers. How the association of Diakonia of United Church of Canada (DUCC) was formed. She then reviewed the years in which national gatherings were held and invited folks to indicate which ones they had attended.

Review of Consensus Model

Roland reviewed the model for reaching consensus:

- 1. proposal presented
- 2. questions for clarification
- 3. open discussion—if necessary, small groups
- 4. check for consensus; a) ask or b) straw vote
- 5. if no or undecided, invite further questions for clarification
- 6. again check for consensus
- 7. if no consensus, either table the matter or take a vote with 2/3 majority needed—this would depend upon the issue itself
- 8. return to small groups to discuss implications

After a bit of discussion, we agreed to function using this model.

Agenda Check

Roland referred people to the Agenda, noting the following be added:

- Advocating for diaconal ministry within the system (to Wednesday's afternoon business
- Standards of Practice and Ethical Standards for Ministry Personnel (the Coordinating/Finance cluster will try to find time for this in plenary).
- Replaced Ethical Standards etc. with Restorative Care (break-out groups Wednesday

Approval of 2003 Minutes

Dorothy Naylor introduced this item, referring people to the précis that was sent prior to the gathering. She also mentioned that five people were enlisted to read the entire minutes; Dorothy asked for input from those people. With the exception of a few typos, it was agreed that the Minutes were an accurate reflection of the business sessions of the 2003 National Gathering.

Accountability Reports

(a) Regional Reports Lynda Gow invited representatives from the various regions to offer a brief report about activities in their area.

<u>Newfoundland/Labrador</u> Karen Thorne reported that there has not been a lot of activity among their group; there are only the two of them and they are twelve hours apart. She is feeling the need for better advocacy within the Conference. Karen recorded the need for inclusive language in the small group/break out group

Maritime Eric Tusz-King reported that they meet at the Conference Annual meeting; Lori Crocker indicated they had had a visit from Caryn Douglas (Principal at CCS) to an event for Pastoral Relations committees of the Presbyteries; she also reported on the numbers of new diaconal ministers and current students. David Hewitt said their conference still has a Ministry Personnel & Education Committee on which he serves as a diaconal representative.

Montreal and Ottawa Sally reported that her Conference Celebration of New Ministries last year was very inclusive of diaconal ministry.

Bay of Quinte No report

Manitou No report

<u>Toronto</u> A written report is in our kits. We decided to send a card to Margaret Collard letting her know she was missed.

<u>Hamilton</u> Deb Deavu reported that a small group has been involved in planning for this event, but we haven't had a large gathering for quite a while. One of the highlights is that Roz Vincent-Haven is the incoming President of Hamilton Conference. Deb offered a concern about the lack of full-time positions that would traditionally be identified as diaconal positions. Kathy also mentioned that our Conference is in favour of pursuing the one-rite of entry into ministry in the UCC.

<u>London</u> Lynda Gow referred folks to the written report included in the kits. (see appended report).

Manitoba-Northwestern Ontario Deborah Vitt reported that they had provided a Communications cluster report, but she did say they had gathered not too long ago with a presentation from Ted Dodd. They also meet at their Conference Annual Meetings, gathered specifically during a meal time. 35 of them gathered at Conference at Thunder Bay.

Saskatchewan No report. Roland is moving there in a few weeks and will be connecting.

<u>Alberta-Northwest</u> See written report in the kits. They too meet regularly at Conference Annual meeting to honour comings and goings.

British Columbia Linda Ervin provided a written and verbal report. (see appended report)

- (b) DUCC Coordinating Cluster Roland referred us to the written report that was included in our kits asking us to read it and think about any questions.
- (c) DUCC Communications Cluster Lynda Gow referred us to the written report that was included in our kits, asking us to read it and think about any questions.

Business 2—Wednesday, April 6—11:20a.m.

Accountability Reports (con't.)

DUCC Coordinating Cluster Lynda Gow introduced their report indicating highlights including the membership numbers. (see appended report)

DUCC Communications Cluster Deborah Vitt referred folks to their report, identifying the highlights, including the creation of a website for DUCC which is now in existence at ducc.ca and is currently under construction. Their committee is recommending that an honorarium of \$200.00 a year be given to the webmaster. Thanks was expressed to this cluster for their good work. (see appended report)

Madonna Fradsham, brought greetings.

Madonna was the ecumenical guest, from the Association of Anglican Deacons in Canada.

National Gathering Planning Cheryl Kirk reported on the activities of this planning group from London Conference. Joan Tuchlinsky talked about the issue of honorarium for those involved in the various aspects of our events. She referred to those involved in providing the theme times. Cheryl Kirk talked about changes to the travel pool structure, specifically that we no longer get substantial funding from the National church towards it, so the amounts that people receive may be substantially less than in the past. Thanks was expressed to this cluster for their good work.

Local Arrangements Lori Crocker reported that so far things seem to be going well here. She offered her thanks to those who had to wait at the airport for transportation to the Centre. She indicated that Tatamagouche Centre had been particularly great to work with and very supportive. Lori expressed that it has been helpful to be the Local Arrangements cluster because it has forced them to be in touch with one another and to come together as a Maritime Conference group.

Theological Schools

- Francis Sandy Theological Centre—Dorothy Naylor referred folks to the written report that was included in our kits, then Betty Lou McNabb spoke to the report. (see appended report)
- Dr. Jessie Saulteaux Resource Centre—Lynda Gow referred to the written report that had been distributed. (see appended report) Deborah Vitt brought greetings from Melody McKellar.

- Centre for Christian Studies—Caryn Douglas showed a presentation to those gathered; it is a three minute presentation that can be used to introduced someone to CCS. She then referred people to the written report, highlighting what lies ahead. Things are great at CCS—strong, talented staff, a study body numbering around 50. The only not-so-great thing is the funding support; they have created a new committee to do some re-visioning with a mandate to imagine bold new initiatives. Their funding from the national church has been cut by \$100,000.00 so they need to really look at what needs to change in order to keep fulfilling the need that exists. Caryn encouraged us to seek out financial supporters in our communities.
- Ted Dodd offered a recognition of those in our midst who graduated from schools outside the three foregoing schools namely Emmanuel College, and the Western Field-Based Program.

International Voices

DOTAC—Linda Ervin referred to her written report, and presented brochures about the organization. (see appended report)

Business 3—Wednesday, April 6—2:00p.m. International Voices (con't).

DOTAC (con't.)—Linda Ervin continued her report by talking about the DiakAid project of World Federation of Diakonia. A few projects which have been funded through this fund are: Korean Diaconal Sisters; translation of several books for Methodist training in Indonesia; IELCB—a Brazilian Lutheran group; Zambia project—helped to buy chickens for orphans to care for and to sell their eggs for the purchase of medicine to fight AIDS. The World Federation is also supporting relief efforts in Southeast Asia. (see appended report).

Kaufmann Fund Roland referred us to the written report in our kits and invited us to read it over. Cheryl Kirk mentioned that she had applied to the Fund on behalf of the gathering, seeking a donation towards the travel pool. The Fund committee indicated that they felt that it was outside their mandate to do that, and that if we wanted their mandate changed, that would be something directed by this gathering.

Barb Elliott Trust Fund Roland referred us to the written report in our kits and invited us to read it over, then invited Eric to speak to it. Eric highlighted that he and Marilyn Anderson-Corkum are retiring from the Administrative Committee and that this gathering needs to name replacements. The Coordinating Cluster suggested Russell Mitchell-Walker from Regina and Christine Dudley from B.C. Lynda Gow invited questions. We decided to establish a term of five years and agreed to the appointments of Russell and Christine.

MEPS (Ministry Education and Personnel Services) Roland directed us to a letter from Jim Blanchard of MEPS, in which he responded to our invitation to send representation to our gathering. He also invites us to contact him or someone at General Council to arrange a meeting to share our issues/concerns in relation to advocacy and diaconal ministry. Lynda Gow reported that MEPS (and its former beings) had provided financial support to our educational events on a regular basis, but that in order to receive it, we need to ask for it. This is raised in particular for the incoming Coordinating cluster. This issue of advocacy will be discussed in one of our break-out groups.

DOTAC-Discussion and decision re proposal

Roland introduced this item, referring to the document that had been provided, outlining the proposal. There were a few questions for clarification, during which time it was suggested that in this case, we attempt to introduce a successor for our current representative who would be mentored toward replacing her after her third term. A question was asked if others can attend who are not representatives. It was explained that anyone can go but they are not a voting delegate, and the cost would have to be picked up by the person or by DUCC. It would be possible for a successor to attend meetings with our official delegate, to learn. The proposal was: a) that there be an election for this position every four years

b) that the incumbent, following the first term, may stand for election for two additional terms.

Madonna Fradsham

As we headed to the break, our guest Deacon, Madonna Fradsham offered us a time of theological reflection on the parable of the farmer planting seeds.

Business 4—Wednesday, April 6—3:30p.m. (Karen Thorne recording)

DOTAC Proposal re representation (con't.)

Discussion continued on the proposal, with the following addition.

a) that there be an election for this position every 4 years

b) that the incumbent, following the first term, may stand for election for 2 additional terms

c) that at the beginning of a second or third term, whichever is applicable, a successor be elected as a non-voting member of DOTAC for the last 2 years of the term. Expenses would be covered by DUCC.

The whole group was not ready to make a decision at this time. The Coordinating Committee invited further input and suggested that they bring back a proposal for later discussion.

Feedback from Breakout Groups

Group 1

I. Advocacy for diaconal ministry within the General Council offices:

It is recommended that we add to our DUCC national structure another cluster called the 'DUCC liaison with the General Council Offices

The role would include:

- monitoring
- liaison
- support
- recruitment
- consultation

The group could be dispersed geographically and would report back to the DUCC coordinating cluster. CONSENSUS was reached on this recommendation.

2. Regarding the issue of diaconal ministers transferring into the UCC: It is recommended that a letter be written to Ministry Vocations with a copy to Evelyn Rigby, who is on the Ministry Vocations Committee, that there be consideration given to diaconal formation for diaconal ministers transferring from other denominations into the UCC. The letter should include background explaining how important formation of diaconal identity is for preparation for UCC candidates for diaconal ministry. UCC diaconal ministers are wanting those entering from another denomination to have opportunity to be trained in the UCC ethos of

diaconal ministry and to develop connections and community within the UCC diaconate. CONSENSUS was reached on this recommendation.

- 3. Betty Marlin has drafted some suggestions for DUCC to consider regarding the recognition of diaconal ministries that are currently not recognized, such as social ministries, and presbyteries appointments. (see appended letter from Betty). More information was needed on this matter. This was endorsed as an ideal at the last General Council but there had been no strategy for getting there. The new Coordinating cluster was requested to develop a strategy on this such as, a letter to MEPS.
- 4. Regarding the study entitled 'Faith Talk' from the National Church. We were encouraged to hold informal gatherings to formulate a response to this study with particular attention to the section on ordered ministry (pg 19-21). For information, Debra Schweyer is on the committee of Theology and Faith.

Business 5—Wednesday, April 6—7:00p.m.

Feedback from Break-out Groups Group 2

1. Proposed Testamur. Discussion had been sparked by a proposal from Emmanuel College to Education for Church Leadership (ECL) requesting that they be permitted to train persons for Diaconal ministry. Irene Rainey is on ECL and brought this issue for discussion.

Recommendation: That a communication be written by the Coordinating Cluster to ECL and copied to Emmanuel College, raising concerns about the current proposal and requesting that they be in consultation with DUCC and the diaconal community.

Expressed concerns included:

Can formation for diaconal ministry be adequately done simply through a mentor, or is it important to have a residential, community experience?

Would such a proposal drain funds away from the Centre for Christian Studies?

The letter should be copied also to Kathy Toivanen and Caryn Douglas. Deborah Vitt agreed to draft a letter and then have it sent through the Coordinating cluster. CONSENSUS was reached.

2. Funding for Diaconal theological education.

Recommendation: That a letter be written by the Coordinating cluster regarding the issues of ethics and justice around funding formula for theological schools, since not all schools have the same financial resources. CONSENSUS was reached on this.

3. Internships—Caryn Douglas indicated that in a recent meeting of deans and principals, there had been discussion about reviewing the structuring of internships within the educational process for students in the ordination stream, in that it is disruptive to the educational process.

If funding is provided for the internship experience, then how should they, in a similar way fund the field-based component for diaconal students?

Group 3

Staff Associates—Group 3 affirmed the decision made in 1997 to welcome staff associates to DUCC. The group found the statement in the registration brochure to be inclusive to others, such as staff associates: 'DUCC is open to those who see themselves as working in a diaconal style....'. Regional groups have sometimes included staff associates in their gatherings, and this was encouraged by Group 3. They suggested that there be regional contact persons for further DUCC events so that persons such as staff associates might be more comfortable to ask any questions they might have about the organization.

Concern was expressed how some positions are being divided up so as to circumvent the church

rules around pensions, etc.

Group 4

Diaconal Identity - the Ordination Question

The question of having one rite of entry into ministry for both ordinands and commissionands was discussed, including the idea of diaconal people being "ordained" to ministries of service, education, pastoral care. There have been church studies and discussions in the past on this issue that basically reaffirmed the status quo.

Recommendation: That the theme time for the next DUCC gathering be on this topic, with consultation invited also in advance of the gathering.

The large group offered a suggestion that instead of making it the theme of the meeting that there be an in-depth discussion of this issue, including adequate preparation time in advance of the DUCC meeting, i.e. a mail-out containing the history, concerns and implications. AGREED.

Group 5

- 1. Budget 2005—Budget only to be presented tonight for approval by DUCC. AGREED Discussion followed as the budget was presented. (See attached) CONSENSUS was reached on the budget as presented.
- 2. Unionization: Information and strategy—It was recommended that people read their emails on this matter, and that it is important that if a vote is called, that people express their views by voting as opposed to refusing to vote. If even a very small number of people vote and the majority are in favor, it could mean that all ministers would be required to pay union membership dues, even if they refused to join the union.
- 3. Restorative Care for Diaconal Ministers in Outreach Ministries including overseas mission personnel. The Restorative Care Program is intended to provide funding for replacement personnel in situations where the ministry personnel becomes ill for an extended time. Pastoral charges contribute to this program; however those in alternate ministries do not have this paid.

Recommendation: That a letter be written to MEPS asking why restorative care is not available to personnel in outreach ministries, requesting that they find a way to enable contributions to be paid into the plan to enable restorative care to be available to groups currently not able to access the plan. The group suggested named in the letter that this issue especially affects diaconal ministers since so many work in outreach ministries. Anne Duncan agreed to initiate a draft on this and forward it to the Coordinating cluster. The group also suggested the letter be copied to the Chair of Mission Support Grants Committee. CONSENSUS was reached on this matter.

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4. Education Project (Booklets and a process for education about diaconal ministry for Pastoral Relations and Education and Students committees, produced by CDM in 2003). Some changes had been formulated at the DUCC 2003 regarding the content of the booklets, however this task of updating the booklets had not been fully completed. Kathy Toivanen offered to write up a new introductory paragraph. The London cluster offered to make any other helpful suggestions for updating the remaining material, as well as preparing a power point presentation or DVD that could be used as a tool for education about diaconal ministry.

Once the booklets have been updated, the group imagined having some diaconal ministers approach Conference personnel ministers and persons in other appropriate positions to offer copies of the updated booklets and other created resources to them, suggesting that they might use the booklets to raise the profile and to promote diaconal ministry. A concern was raised about whether it is helpful for this group to be doing the work that rightfully should be done by the national church. More conversation tomorrow was deemed necessary on this topic.

Small Group Regional Clusters

We were invited to gather into our regional groups to consider what role, if any, we would be willing to take on.

Maritime Conference offered to take on the role of Coordinating Cluster, with Kay Dean becoming the Treasurer.

London Cluster needed a break but was willing to do the work on the educational booklets. Hamilton Cluster is willing to prepare the theme for the next DUCC meeting.

Ann Naylor and Kathy Platt have offered to be part of the newly formed liaison cluster and would welcome more persons to this group.

Manitoba Northwestern Ontario offered to continue doing communications.

Alberta/Northwest Cluster is willing to host the next DUCC meeting.

Linda Ervin is going to check with folks in B.C. and Sask. Clusters about possibly doing the planning for the next meeting.

The evening concluded with a presentation and theological reflection by our guest Madonna Fradsham, followed by worship service in the chapel.

Business 6 - Thursday, April 7, 2005 - 7:00 - 8:45 p.m. (Kathy Platt recording)

Nancy Corrigan danced around the circle to call to order our business session.

Question: How will the follow-up to the educational project happen?

- The concern is that the national church is not doing the advocacy, so how will it be done if not by us?
- Needs to be part of the conversation that happens with MEPS
- Also need to consult more widely if major changes need to happen to the books the budget that is available might not be enough to create totally new booklets
- Videos are very expensive to produce \$1,000 per minute
- Why not use the web rather than produce a new booklet?
- London cluster will work with the present booklet, and then it could be presented to MEPS as a resource that is needed
- Between London and the coordinating cluster, they would decide what needed to be presented to MEPS
- Also need to find a way to involve the Conference Personnel ministers in the process

Representation to DOTAC - recommendations from business committee

1. Re-affirm Linda Ervin for a third term

2. Future tenure be a maximum of 12 years or three terms

3. A person will be elected 2 years before the end of the incumbent's term – a non-voting rep. The appointment takes effect the following year.

4. The expenses for this one year will be covered by DUCC

Representative needs to be re-affirmed every 4 years and the incumbent needs to inform DUCC two years prior to the completion of the current term if the person wants to carry on for another term. The incumbent needs to be intentional about telling DUCC whether they will continue or not before every national gathering. The Coordinating committee needs to be intentional about reminding people to apply before the national gathering.

A large round of applause was offered in thanks for Linda's very capable leadership.

Consensus was reached for the above recommendations.

Kaufman fund

It was proposed that we reaffirm the following people: Linda Appleby, Sue Browning, Margarete Emminghaus, and Elaine Graham to continue to sit on the Kaufman Fund committee. Consensus was reached. The Communication committee will send them a card of thanks.

A reminder that DUCC could encourage this committee to enlarge their mandate to include allocation of monies from this fund to support the travel pool for this national gathering. The Kaufman fund was created in 1985. Prior to DUCC – they asked DUCC to support it.

Suggest a letter be written asking for them to consider giving a lump sum for the travel pool, advising them that some that apply to the travel pool are students — wait for their response. Consensus was reached — the Co-ordinating committee will be asked to write the letter.

Newsletter – presented by Caryn Douglas from Communications committee Task group: Kay Dean, Linda Clark, Caryn Douglas, Ruth Cairns, Dorothy Naylor – phone conversation

-reviewed the previous mandate to come up with the proposal they are presenting -recommending editorial committee; editor; layout committee/person

Proposing the name: DiakoNews - news for and about the diaconal community

Proposal is missing the current agreement between DUCC and the national church—need to include it in writing what the agreement will be—that they will run off and mail out

MEPS has not yet figured out how to circulate the newsletter other than in hard copy – will not likely know how to do that before the next national gathering of DUCC

Suggestion that it would be good to send it to theological schools; and each of the membership of DOTAC (12), and World Federation (about 60); Presbytery secretaries – asking them to circulate it to the Pastoral Relations committees and E & S committees

There was discussion about the proposed name.

Reached consensus on the proposal for the newsletter with the name remaining as Diaconal News, and with the additions to the mailing list as above.

Ethical Standards and Practice of Ministry - Anne Duncan

- has been on this committee for 3 years
- began when there was contemplation of moving to a 3 court system
- kept going even when it was decided to stay at a 4 court system
- last March began a consultation across the church asking people to respond to several questions – received 142 responses back
- now will send out the draft standards and wait for responses
- Anne is only diaconal person on the committee
- On page 4, (h) who should these standards be applied to?

Ended the discussion at this point, with the understanding people would look over the document and come back tomorrow for a 15 minute discussion.

Madonna ended the evening by sharing another reflection. And then we moved into worship.

Business 7—Friday, April 8—9:00a.m. (Linda Clark recording)

Revisit evaluation on how we need to plan our National gathering.

Joan Tuchlinsky introduced this item making suggestions for upcoming gatherings. Any group or cluster that offers their gifts would not have an honorarium. She mentioned that they discussed the idea of looking after providing each aspect of our gathering ourselves so that we don't have extra costs. We entered into discussion about how this idea sits with everyone. The comments seemed to support this idea. Cheryl Kirk pointed out existing policy - that if someone involved in the planning requires assistance to be here then they could apply to the Coordinating Cluster for it. One other comment was that we keep in mind that it would be helpful to invite a visitor/guest from the World Diakonia to help keep us connected. It was questioned whether or not this inhibits the theme planners should they need to invite an outside resource person. It was clarified that this was an important notation to keep in mind that the theme folks would be allowed to do so. Roland summarized the discussion and sought consensus. CONSENSUS was reached.

Cheryl Kirk reported that with the contributions to the travel pool, and the fact that a number of people chose not to apply for travel pool money, the planning cluster will be able to cover 70%

Idea for Continuing Education

Eric introduced the idea that we could try to identify ourselves as a learning community with the General Council Continuing Education committee, which could offset a portion of the costs associated with putting on this event. This would preclude any of the participants from applying for an individual continuing education grant. It was suggested that a letter be written by the Coordinating cluster to the Committee to see if this group could be labelled a learning community. CONSENSUS was reached.

Standards of Practice and Ethical Standards

Anne Duncan invited folks to offer any comments on the document. A question was raised about the definition of the term "bias" included in the document. Irene Rainey mentioned that she thinks the document generally is missing the notion of mutuality—that we are learning with and from those with whom we are in ministry. Anne encouraged us all to respond to the document.

Irene Rainey asked if there are folks here who want to be part of the editorial committee or become the layout person. Folks were invited to approach the Communications cluster if they have an interest in this.

Next Gathering

Lynda Gow tested the group on holding our next gathering in two years. AGREED. Linda Ervin suggested that a person from the World Federation and DOTAC be invited to our next gathering. She also asked if the Coordinating Cluster could look at creating a proposal for how to handle

Making a prayer flag

Materials

Rectangles of cloth [blue, white, red green, yellow]
Fabric markers
Yarn or thin string
Sewing materials or stapler
Corrugated card [larger than cloth]
Push pins
Paper and pencils

Before you begin – sit quietly and think about your intention for your flag. Close your eyes and let images that represent your intention come into your mind. Sketch the images if that is helpful.

Write the words of your blessing or prayer. [see Buddhist prayer below] Reflect upon what colour would best complement the words and images that have come to mind.

Traditionally, flags are made in 5 colours, representing one of the 5 elements. Blue –space White – water Red – fire Green – air Yellow – earth

Step 1 Fold over 1 inch of fabric at the short end of the cloth and sew or staple the hem.

Step 2 Stretch cloth onto cardboard and pin in place.

Step 3 Draw symbols around the edges of the flag [first with pencil, then with fabric markers].

Write words for prayer/blessing in the centre.

Step 4 Thread string through folded edge.

Hanging flags

When hanging your prayer flag, begin by creating a sacred atmosphere. Choose a location that is out in the open, where the wind moves freely. Tie the string securely.


PRAYER FLAGS – prayer in motion

Background

Prayer flags are flown all over the Tibetan world – on mountains, roof-tops, at monasteries, from bridges – almost anywhere the wind is likely to catch them. When the wind blows through the flags, the prayers inscribed on them are carried to all beings. The Tibetan word for flag is *lung ta* meaning "wind horse". The wind horse is a symbol of strength and freedom from fear that represents a transformative state of mind.

The Tibetan Buddhists believe the wind passes over the surface of the flag, consecrating and harmonising the air with the words and symbols that have been inscribed on it. The prayers are then carried by the wind to infinite destinations, blessing everything they touch. Ultimately the flags fade in the elements: this is seen as evidence that the blessings are being carried by the wind and being released into the world.

Wisdom is a state of the human mind and spirit characterized by deep understanding and profound insight. It is elaborated as a quality possessed by the sages but also treasured as folk wisdom and wit. Wisdom is the power of discernment, deeper understanding, and creativity; it is the ability to move and to dance, to make the connections, to savour life and to learn from experience. Its root meaning comes to the fore in the Latin word *sapientia*, which is derived from the verb *sapere* = to taste and to savour something. Wisdom is intelligence shaped by experience and sharpened by critical analysis. It is the ability to make sound choices and incisive decisions.

Wisdom, unlike intelligence, is not something with which a person is born. It comes only from living, from making mistakes and trying again and from listening to others who have made mistakes and tried to learn from them. It is perception of wholeness that does not lose sight of particularity, relativity, and the intricacies of relationships. Wisdom understands complexity and seeks integrity in relationships.

... Wisdom is neither a specialized discipline nor a discrete field of study. It is a radical democratic concept insofar as it does not require extensive schooling and formal education. Unschooled people can acquire wisdom and highly educated people might lack it.
